## Homecoming from Overseas

I became a Lasallian when I joined La Salle Primary School way back in 1969. Primary school was quite calm with obligatory football injuries, and the excitement of annual class picnics complete with bean guns. Somehow, I got through to La Salle College. I loved cycling to school as did my classmate Lester Huang (77). We had somewhere to park and hide our bicycles. My hair grew longer, my myopia got worse, the flare bottom trousers got more severe, and my results were bad especially for Chinese. I decided I ought to make a new start and left for boarding school in England after completing Form 3. Brother Michael was Careers Master and sent quite a few of my cohort to Prior Park College, an Irish Christian Brothers school. And so I stayed on and have been in the UK for over 47 years now. After the first few years, I had lost touch with my classmates. It is only through social media that we have been reconnected in the last decade. Following the pandemic, I really wanted to return to HK to see my family and my 77 classmates. I also really wanted to attend the 90<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations.

When Brian Ho (73) returned to Hong Kong, I was appointed Convenor of the UK Chapter of LSCOBA. There were very few permanent members then. Most were transients, students at boarding school and universities, and old boys in earlier careers working for a few years in the UK before returning to Hong Kong. One such person is Norman Wong (02, vide infra) whom I got to know when he was at a nearby boarding school. He subsequently became the Chapter's secretary until he returned to live and work in Hong Kong. The scene has changed. In recent years, there have been many new immigrants and we have now close to 150 old boys in our chapter's informal WhatsApp group. When the dessert came, they were enormous 壽包 with a lit candle. I was so overjoyed I offered to pay for everybody, but the offer was declined. The birthday buns were large and delicious, and I shall never forget the surprise party. The other memorable occasion was attending a WG dinner. For the uninitiated, WG stands for Whisky Guzzlers. It is a club founded by a few of my 77 classmates. To join, you need first to be a Lasallian, second a whisky aficionado, and there can only be two members from each year. There is an exception for 77ers when there can be unlimited numbers. The dinner was a Black Tie (tuxedo) affair, and we tasted maybe nine whiskies, paired with our food. There were two special whiskies. They were privately bottled single cask single malts. Brother Jude and I had the privilege to open the two bottles – it was a world premiere! Only Lasallians can purchase these numbered bottles with profits donated to the La Salle Foundation.
